Canadian Armed Forces Pilot to Civilian Conversion

At the Regina Flying Club we have helped many Canadian Forces Pilots with their conversion to a civilian licence. Transport Canada outlines the requirements that must be met in order to obtain any given licence. Ultimately Transport Canada is the one deciding if you meet the requirements or not to convert, but at RFC we will help guide you through this process as it can be a very individualized process based on your needs and experience. Even if you have not successfully completed a Canadian Armed Forces Pilot Training Course, you may still be eligible to credit some of the training time you do have. Each military to civilian pilot conversion has individual factors and nuances. The authority of whether or not to grant a full conversion, or any part thereof, rests ultimately with Transport Canada. If you believe that you have met a specific requirement for full or partial credit towards

a specific civilian licence or rating, the more substantiation you are able to provide, the greater the chances of credit being given from Transport Canada. Common pieces of evidence include, but are not limited to the following: logbook scans, record of ground school, progress cards etc. Assemble all evidence possible, and explain your situation in an e-mail to the following address:

A response can sometimes take 1-2 months, but a licensing officer eventually will respond and give you a thorough answer.
